

December Newsletter for Girvan North.

Dear friends, In the town of Nazareth, around 2,000 years ago, there was a young woman called Mary. She was engaged to be married to a carpenter named Joseph. One day an angel appeared to say she had been chosen to have a special baby. It would be God's son, and he would be called Jesus. Soon after the angel told them this news, Mary and Joseph married. Mary was heavily pregnant, and Joseph and Mary were told they must go on a long journey to Bethlehem, Joseph's hometown. Sadly, there was no room at every inn they went to, as it was full of people who were paying their taxes. One kindly innkeeper allowed them to stay in their stable. It was there Mary gave birth to Jesus. Shepherds on the hillside overlooking Bethlehem were told the Good News of Jesus' birth. The shepherds arrived and worshipped baby Jesus. Then the Magi, or Wise Men, worshipped the Christ child, each bearing gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh. They followed a star which guided them to Bethlehem where baby Jesus lay. King Herod said he wanted to worship him too but secretly wanted to kill him. The Christmas nativity is probably one of the most recognisable elements of the Christmas period. They generally contain baby Jesus in a manger, Mary, Joseph, the shepherds, angels, various stable animals, and sometimes the Three Wise Men

St. Francis of Assisi created the first nativity scene in 1223 to promote what Christmas should truly mean for us, and why Jesus Christ should be worshipped. It is difficult now to imagine a time when a nativity scene does not occupy a prominent role in a church, in a house, or in a play at this time of year.

Most nativity scenes took place in a stable or in a cave. Whilst Jesus may have been born there, it is just as likely that Jesus was born in the lower level of a home, amongst animals who were brought in for the night. The angelic involvement took place on the hillside with the shepherds rather than the angels hovering over the stable where Jesus lay. Also the Three Wise Men who often feature in the nativity did not see Jesus on the night of his birth. They instead saw Jesus when he was around two years old. Despite these differences nothing can take

us away from the importance of this nativity scene.

The most significant message for any nativity scene is what is communicated to the world. As the sins of humankind needed a perfect sacrifice to be laid before God, our heavenly Father sent his own Son, Jesus Christ, to live amongst us as a human being who would also die a human death. It was a tragically painful death which that child of Mary would ultimately suffer on the Cross, but this human child was also a Divine being and so would rise again. Every person who believed in this would be forgiven of all sin and promised eternal life.

This is the purpose of the nativity story. It focusses our mind on the Christ child rather than on ourselves. Christ's birth can help to redeem a broken world, can help reconcile those who were previously irreconcilable, can help to end all wars, and can help each of us have a fresh start. Everything that has happened before is in the past, but it is what is happening today, and in the future, that matters so much more.

Expenditure in September was higher due to the quarterly payments for telephone, gas and electricity and the quarterly salary payments to church officer, organist and secretary.

We have recently updated our photocopier with a newer model. We have managed to negotiate a cheaper annual rental cost and a reduction in copying costs.

A couple in our congregation have kindly offered to buy new chairs for the church lounge. The Kirk Session unanimously agreed to accept this very generous offer.

As I look back over the income for 2019 I would like to thank those members who give so generously to the Church in different ways.

The 12 Days of Christmas

Day 1 (25th December): Christmas Day - celebrating the Birth of Jesus Day 2 (26th December also known as Boxing Day): St Stephen's Day. He was the first Christian martyr (someone who dies for their faith). It's also the day when the Christmas Carol 'Good King Wenceslas' takes place. Day 3 (27th December): St John the Apostle (One of Jesus's Disciples and friends) Day 4 (28th December): The Feast of the Holy Innocents - when people remember the baby boys which King Herod killed when he was trying to find and kill the Baby Jesus. Day 5 (29th December): St Thomas Becket. He was Archbishop of Canterbury in the 12th century and was murdered on 29th December 1170 for challenging the King's authority over the Church. Day 6 (30th December): St Egwin of Worcester. Day 7 (31st December): New Year's Eve (known as Hogmanay in Scotland). Pope Sylvester I is traditionally celebrated on this day. He was one of the earliest popes (in the 4th Century). In many central and eastern European countries (including Austria, Bosnia and Herzegovina, Croatia, Czechia, Germany, Hungary, Israel, Italy, Luxembourg, Poland, Slovakia, Switzerland and Slovenia) New Year's Eve is still sometimes called 'Silvester'. In the UK, New Year's Eve was a traditional day for 'games' and sporting competitions. Archery was a very popular sport and during the middle ages it was the law that it had to be practised by all men between ages 17-60 on Sunday after Church! This was so the King had lots of very good archers ready in case he need to go to war! Day 8 (1st January): 1st January - Mary, the Mother of Jesus Day 9 (2nd January): St. Basil the Great and St. Gregory Nazianzen, two important 4th century Christians. Day 10 (3rd January): Feast of the Holy Name of Jesus. This remembers when Jesus was officially 'named' in the Jewish Temple. It's celebrated by different churches on a wide number of different dates! Day 11 (4th January): St. Elizabeth Ann Seton, the first American saint, who lived in the 18th and 19th centuries. In the past it also celebrated the feast of Saint Simon Stylites (who lives on a small platform on the top of a pillar for 37 years!). Day 12 (5th January also known as Epiphany Eve): St. John Neumann who was the first Bishop in American. He lived in the 19th century.

Nativity Plays and Cribs

Christmas is the celebration of the birth of Jesus. The word nativity comes from the latin word 'natal' which means birth (and is also where we get the word 'native' from).

It is traditional in the UK for Primary (Elementary) schools to perform Nativity Play for the parents and local people associated with the school. The Nativity Play recreates the scene of Jesus' Birth and tells of how Mary and Joseph were visited by the Shepherds and Wise Men. The parts of Mary, Joseph, the Shepherds and the Wise Men are played by children. If the school is attached to a Church, the play often takes place in the Church. Sunday Schools in Churches also sometimes put on Nativity Plays.

In the past, it was common for live animals including an ox and donkey and other farm animals (but not pigs) to be used in the plays. Sometimes they still are, but it is now more common for children to dress up as the animals in costumes or to have animal props.

The first Nativity Play was not performed by Children in the UK, but in a cave by Monks in Italy! St. Francis of Assisi and his followers acted in the first play in 1223 to remind the local population that Jesus was born for them, as he was born into a poor family like theirs and not to a rich family.

St. Francis told the part of each character in the story himself using wooden figures in the play. After a couple of years, the play had become so popular that real people played the parts of the characters in the story. Songs were sung by the people taking part and they became what we call Christmas carols today!

Now cribs are used in Churches all over the world and even in some homes to remind people of the story. Sometimes religious pictures and statues are called icons. Some Catholic and Orthodox Christians have icons of Mary and the baby Jesus in their homes.

Prayer Topics December 2019

1. The Leprosy Mission - Bangladesh

Pray for self-help group members in Dhaka that receive training in such skills as book keeping, ulcer care, net-working and vocations. Pray that with these skills they can build up and support their groups, increase group income and gain access to livelihood opportunities as well as contacts that help them advocate their rights.

2. Mission Aviation Fellowship - Arnhem Land

The country has a tropical monsoon climate with we season – which lasts from October to March – currently affecting our pilots' ability to fly. Please pray for their safety, as thunder storms can be a real challenge. Pray for wisdom, understanding and patient perseverance for those currently translating the Bible into indigenous languages. Pray also for evangelist James Marawili whose desire is to share Christ's love with his fellow aboriginal Australians. Many depend upon MAF aircraft to deliver people like James to towns such as Garrthalala.

3. Open Doors - Iraq

Give thanks for the success of several youth gatherings in Bartella, Caramles and Ankawa, which were attended by thousands of young people. Ask the Lord to give young Iraqui Christians the courage and faith to stay in Iraq so that the light of the church is not extinguished.

Thousands of Yazidis are still unable to return to their homes in Sinjar from where I.S. ousted them in 2014. Many live in tents in desperate conditions. Ask the Lord to provide a way for them to go home and pray that many will find a lasting home in Him.

4. The angels brought a message of hope and joy to the world on the first Christmas. Pray that God would enable us to experience its reality in this world of war, violence, hatred and bloodshed. Pray that militant

extremists will be prevented from carrying out their fiendish plans to cause havoc and untold misery at this special season. Remember all people for whom this will be a particularly difficult time – the bereaved, the lonely, the homeless, all refugees and prisoners. In the midst of all our busyness, pray that we may take time to be still and marvel once again at the wondrous fact of the Lord of the universe leaving the glory of Heaven to come and dwell with us on earth to reveal to us the Father's love.

Pray for the forthcoming election and its outcome, that agreement might be reached by all parties as a way forward.

Pray for the ongoing decisions to be made about our churches here that the results may be acceptable to everyone and that we may consider each other. Ask for the Lord's blessing on all Christmas services and pray that we may have new and deeper thoughts insights into the Gospel story of Christmas and that God may be praised and magnified in all things.


