

November Newsletter for Girvan North.

Dear friends, as we approach Remembrance Sunday, I would like to write about George Matheson. He probably is best remembered as the writer of "O love that wilt not let me go." He served as Minister of Innellan Church, and then of St. Bernard's Church, in Edinburgh. He was practically blind. His life story inspires us all.

On June 6th, 1882, the day his sister got married, his family stayed overnight in Glasgow, whilst George remained in the Manse. George sat alone in the darkness, in his blindness, in emotional turmoil. No one knew the reason for this, but his heart cried out to Christ. These comforting words he quickly wrote down, eased his pain:

O love that wilt not let me go, I rest my weary soul in Thee; I give Thee back the life I owe, That in Thine ocean depths its flow May richer, fuller be. O Light that followest all my way, I yield my flickering torch to Thee; My heart restores its borrowed ray, That in Thy sunshine's blaze its day May brighter, fairer be. O Joy that seekest me through pain, I cannot close my heart to Thee; I climb the rainbow through the rain, And feel the promise is not vain, That morn shall tearless be. O Cross that liftest up my head, I dare not ask to fly from thee; I lay in dust's life glory dead, And from the ground their blossoms red Life that shall endless be.

The poem was finished in less than 5 minutes. The only alteration was line 3 of stanza 3." I climb" became "I trace." It was usually so difficult

for George to write lyrics so quickly, but these lyrics came easily to him. He surely received his guidance from God. These verses which George has written, whilst experiencing such terrible pain, became one of the best known hymns in the Church Hymnary.

George was born in 1842 to parents George and Jane Matheson. He was the first of eight children and had the poorest eyesight. He was educated at Glasgow Academy and then Glasgow University. He received his Bachelor's Degree, in Philosophy, in 1861, and his Master's Degree in the following year. He wore powerful glasses to read at school, and always would sit next to the light of the window to assist his vision. Although he was never completely blind, he depended on others to get through every day.

George was not easily discouraged, and many who heard him preach did not realise he was blind. George's sisters helped him overcome the loneliness he felt. His eldest sister helped him around the house, wrote down his dictated Sermons, and assisted him in the Parish he served.

He was Ordained as a Minister by the Presbytery at Sandyford, as an assistant to Dr. McDuff. He had greater responsibility when he was Minister at Innellan. Parishioners did not realise he was blind as he frequently appeared to glance down at his notes. He had actually committed great portions of his Sermon, and Bible references, to memory. He declined a move to London, and in 1886 moved to St. Bernard's Church in Edinburgh, where he stayed for another 13 years.

He even preached to Queen Victoria about the "patience of Job," and she was very impressed. She wanted more people to hear it, so, the Sermon was published.

As mentioned, the greatest hymn he wrote was: "O love that wilt not let me go." He composed this on the night of his sister's wedding. The sister he so depended on. George would of course be dependent on God, as we all should be. Did George write this hymn due his sister's marriage, or did he write it due to a past love which did not blossom? Who can tell? More importantly, he wrote these words. Whilst Matheson wrote the words, Dr. Albert Peace wrote the music. A partnership

made in heaven.

We achieve very little by our own efforts, but so much more by giving our lives over to Christ. God's glory should be reflected in all of our lives today. It is not through our "flickering torch" that we are strengthened, but through the blaze of the sun's rays shining upon us. When the rainbow appears after the rain, we feel overjoyed. We are then given eternal hope and eternal life through focussing our attention on the Cross of Christ. George Matheson was a great writer, and preacher, and was someone who succeeded despite the limitations that he faced. He knew who Christ was, just as we should know who Christ is. Our focus on this Remembrance Sunday should be on the Creator who gave us life, rather than just on ourselves. I am sure this hymn inspires so many of our soldiers, naval, and air personnel, who have sacrificed so much of their lives to grant us all our freedom, giving us an eternal peace.




