

From the Interim Moderator

I ended my piece in the last untitled newsletter with the expectation that the Electoral Register would be established by 20 Oct 24, and indeed it was. This Register records the names of members of the congregation who can vote in subsequent decisions, including the calling of a minister.

Meanwhile items of value from Givan South church and halls have been distributed to interested parties. The churches at Dailly, Barr, and Colmonell have all been recipients of Items of church furniture. In addition, items have been taken up to the new Valley Church. The alert would notice the pulpit fall from the South now in the North – just one of several small signs of union and continuity.

There are still things to do. The flags will be transferred to the Valley Church together with the war memorial. On 3rd Dec 24 the Presbytery agreed that the Ingram Pipe Organ could be relocated in the Valley Church. There are still hurdles to jump but the relocation is making progress.

On 4/5 Oct 24 all the remaining sellable items were collected in the Old Hall for a two-day sale. The proceeds offset the cost of the final clearance which had to be done to designated sites for different waste types. The church, halls and manse are now ready to go on the market.

A congregational meeting was called for 17 Nov 24 when the Nominating Committee was elected – in alphabetical order – Billy Benson, Isobel Bone, Robert Bone, Anne Fisher, Robert Jess, Stuart Kilpatrick, Jimmy Lindsay, Louise Lindsay, Eric Mackinnon, Pat McCracken, Rob Newsham, Jim Nicol, Joan Walker. Pauline Rattray agreed to act as Clerk to the Committee. The committee met with the Vacancy Procedures Committee from the Presbytery; Jim Nicol was appointed convenor of the Nominating Committee and Stuart Kilpatrick as vice-convenor. The way was now clear to advertise the vacancy.

On 13 Jan 25 the vacancy in Girvan Valley Church was posted on the Church of Scotland website, with a link to the Pastoral Profile. We await expressions of interest that might lead to applications.

SAFEGUARDING UPDATE

Disclosure Scotland has intimated that as of April 2025, it is no longer legal to hold a PVG Certificate if the person is no longer in regulated work with children or vulnerable adults.

Girvan Valley Church has been instructed by The Church of Scotland Safeguarding Office to produce an up to date register of current Certificate holders, removing all members who are no longer in an active role within our Church.

On behalf of the Kirk Session we would like to take this opportunity to thank all those, who over the years have given of their time and talent in the Creche, the Sunday School, the Boys' Brigade and the Girls' Brigade.

For clarification this only affects PVG's relating to the Church of Scotland, and does not relate to Certificates connected to work or any other organisation.

Emmaus Window.

Our church has been blessed with four beautiful stained glass windows depicting events in the life of our Lord.

In 1889 the Edinburgh firm of James Ballantyne and Sons were commissioned to design and execute two stained glass windows for the South Transept.

They were donated to the church by Mr Robert Cunningham of Jedburgh in memory of his relatives, Robert, and Thomas McKechnie, who donated an organ to the new church.

The Window on the right records the simple meal at the House of Emmaus, (Luke: 24, 13-35). We see the first post resurrection communion with Jesus and his two travellers he approached - not his closest friends - but ordinary men dejected and in need of spiritual strength.

Jesus is sitting on the right of the table, hallowed, and cloaked in red, the colour of sacrifice. He is the invited guest, but he becomes the host at the table, giving thanks, blessing the bread, breaking it, and is about to give it to his companions. The cup is beside him. It is at this moment the two men on the left draped in blue and gold, realise who he is, the one crucified in Jerusalem, and within a moment of understanding, Jesus will disappear from their sight.

The table is set simply with a white cloth embroidered with pome-granates at the edges. Their seeds are many and full of juice like red wine. In (Exodus 28: 33-34) God orders Moses to put embroidered pomegranates at the bottom of the High Priest's robe.

The top of the window is decorated with grapes and vine leaves, other reminder of the sacrificial blood.

At the bottom right of the window is a bowl of fruit. The purple bowl, the colour of majesty, is inlaid with a white cloth for purity and in and around are nine fruits, including a pineapple with its green spikes resembling a crown. A reminder to us the fruit of the Spirit. (Galatians 5: 22)
